The Weatherization program is designed to make homes more energy efficient and safe. The program is a proven method of reducing high-energy costs and conserving energy in the home. Households can receive attic and wall insulation, weather-stripping of doors and windows, caulking and sealing cracks and holes, storm window installation, furnace retrofitting, and other measures to reduce the energy consumption in the home.

### **Senior Activity Centers**



#### **South Central Arkansas Transit**

The South Central Arkansas Transit (SCAT) and Greyhound programs keep individuals and families connected to safe, reliable transportation services. Through SCAT, public transportation is available at a reduced rate to any person, regardless of income. The service supports a person's efforts to better their lives. SCAT also provides non-emergency medical transportation. CADC serves as a ticket agent for Greyhound, a service designed to connect rural communities with urban areas.

### L.I.H.E.A.P.

The Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) provides families with short-term fuel assistance. CADC's Family Development Program offers Assurance 16, which provides (on a limited basis) a financial incentive to persons completing economic literacy workshops.








### **Early Head Start/Head Start/ABC**







Ms. Grubbs has consistently demonstrated a spirit of help-fulness and compassion towards our families who are caring for children with serious hematological and oncological (hemonc) diagnoses. Thanks to Ms. Grubbs willingness to consider the details of a family's hardship situation and prioritizing a child's health and safety, she was able to remove a barrier for one of our hemonc children to ensure he continues to receive the treatment he needs to restore his health and continue his life.

Since generally people make more effort to write about complaints, I wanted to take the time to write about how helpful Ms. Grubbs has consistently been in finding ways to ensure that families who are facing multiple hardships are able to still have access to quality healthcare for their children. Not only is this a win for the families, but it is also a win for the state and for taxpayers, as by providing a way for families to receive the outpatient treatments they need, they are less likely to present to emergency rooms or be hospitalized; services that are a lot more expensive than outpatient treatment and transportation rides.

Her daughter is attending Headstart in Arkadelphia. Without the services of Scat, Ms. Digiacomo and her child would not be able to attend GED class or Headstart.

Austin Lane has been a rider at Hot Springs Scat f or seven years. He rides from Mt. Ida to Hot Springs five days a week to special classes and to Little Rock doctor appointment. It is neat seeing how he has grown up riding the Scat bus and seeing how his social skills have changed throughout these years. He enjoys riding and seeing everything through the bus windows.

Magnolia Scat provides transportation for Orene Jones to her Dialysis appointments three times each week. Ms. Jones does not have transportation available to her. Ms. Jones' daughter lives in Dallas, TX. Ms. Jones' daughter sends payment for her Mother to ride Magnolia Scat buses. Both Mother and daughter are very appreciative and happy with Magnolia Scat bus services. Scat helps Ms. Jones be independent and live in her home.

Loleta Davis, Fordyce Site Supervisor has been riding as a bus attendant in the morning and the afternoon for the First Step School bus routes in Fordyce. Fordyce Scat has recently acquired these new clients as bus riders. At first it was overwhelming to take on so many new riders. Loleta has found out that in times of trouble, Scat pulls together and does the best they can to get the job done. We appreciate Loleta for the effort she has put forth to accept these responsibilities. Loleta helps make Fordyce Scat a success.

### One Family at a Time

In 1997 life as I knew it made a sudden change. I suddenly became a single mother with two daughters, Jessica age 10 and Haleigh age 3. This change brought many other changes to our lives as well. I closed my licensed, In-Home Day Care and relocated my family to another town. For the first time, in several years, I had to go to work outside of my home and leave my children in the care of someone else. Fortunately, my oldest daughter was in public school, but my three year old was another story. I couldn't find a babysitter that I felt safe leaving her with, and I had to keep my new job. A friend told me that Head Start was accepting children. So, I very reluctantly enrolled her.



I cried like a baby the first day that I left her there. But, that afternoon, all my fears were relieved when I had to literally drag her to the car. She loved it! I can never express how fortunate I felt to I found Head Start. Not only did Haleigh learn and experience so many things, but this program enabled me to be able to provide for my children, and gave me support and encouragement that was very much needed at the time.

In 2003 I went to work for CADC Head Start as a Family Service Worker at the Mt. Ida Head Start. Two years later, I transferred to the CADC Glenwood Head Start where I am still currently working, nearly 16 years later.

Haleigh was a very good student in school. At the end of her 8th grade year she found her passion when she started pole vaulting. She set a new state record and went to the Meet of Champs for the first time when she was in 9th grade. She repeated this for three consecutive years. She currently still holds the 1A State record in Pole Vaulting. She received a full ride scholarship to SNU in Bethany, OK. Unfortunately, she turned it down due to a hip injury. This was a devastating setback, but Haleigh made up her mind that she was still going to go to college. She worked and saved every penny she made and enrolled in UCA in Conway. She



completed her freshman year, and then took a semester off to have her son, Peyton. After this, Haleigh had to continue to work to support her son, so she enrolled in online classes through SAU. When Peyton was old enough, Haleigh enrolled him in the CADC Glenwood Head Start program so that she could continue working and complete college. On May 18, 2018 Haleigh graduated from SAU with a Bachelor's Degree in Elementary Ed K-6. She is currently teaching 5th grade math, science and history at Caddo Hills Middle School.

#### Our story continues:

My oldest daughter, Jessica, started working as a substitute teacher for CADC Head Start in December 2008. Her two sons, Braxton and Matthew, both completed two years each in the program. Jessica is now a full time Teacher Assistant at the CADC Glenwood Head Start. She is also currently enrolled in some college classes to further her education.
