What is Head Start?

The CADC Head Start program was started in 1967 to give children from low-income families a "head start" before they enter elementary school. The main focus is to increase the school readiness of children ages 3 and 4. The program also seeks to help parents and/or caregivers be empowered to self sufficiency.



Head Start Programs

Head Start's services include reading and writing, kindergarten readiness, health and nutrition screening, vision and hearing screening, nutritious meals and snacks, disability services, and family services. While CADC does not offer transportation services, it will assist families in seeking and finding other transportation means.





Family Engagement

Head Start programs hold monthly parent meetings to discuss topics ranging from nutrition, safety, and education matters. They also discuss family development and increased social services. Through the USDA Program, CADC provides nutritious meals, snacks, and nutrition education as a major component of program activities.



History of Head Start

In January of 1964, President Lyndon B. Johnson declared The War on Poverty in his State of the Union speech. Part of the government's thinking on poverty was influenced by new research on the effects of poverty, as well as on the impacts of education. This research indicated an obligation to help disadvantaged groups, compensating for inequality in social or economic conditions. Head Start was designed to help break the cycle of poverty, providing preschool children of low-income families with a comprehensive program to meet their emotional, social, health, nutritional and psychological needs. A key tenet of the program established that it be culturally responsive to the communities served, and that the communities have an investment in its success through the contribution of volunteer hours and other donations as nonfederal share.
